AFSCME STEWARD SPOTLIGHT: ERNEST NIMMONS

Ernest guided the residents to the Maryland Civil Rights commission who immediately contacted the facility. An emergency meeting was held and all the residents were moved as well as allowed to be able to roam freely.

Our union not only advocates for its members, but also for the residents and patients we serve.

AFSCME Starts Bargaining With the USM

This month, members of AFSCME Council 3's higher education bargaining team, made up of members from every USM institution, began meeting with negotiators from the University System of Maryland (USM). In December of last year, the Maryland General Assembly overrode Governor Hogan's veto making consolidated bargaining for all USM campuses directly with the System the law.

The USM can no longer make unilateral changes to working conditions and pay without bargaining with AFSCME. As a result, our bargaining team is negotiating over outstanding health and safety issues as well as the impact of wage compression and increasing the minimum wage to \$15. This year we are preparing to negotiate a full master contract and are urging all members to get involved on campus to ensure we have the best agreement possible.
